DLR Cathaoirleach Visits An Daonchartlann

Councillor Denis O'Callaghan, Cathaoirleach (Chairperson) of Dún Laoghaire Rathdown County Council visited An Daonchartlann-Archive & Research Centre-on Wednesday 30th August 2023.

This was an important fact-finding visit by the Cathaoirleach who has always shown a great interest in the Society's activities and development over the past three decades.

Dún Laoghaire Rathdown County Council has been a huge supporter of the Society since the establishment of this local authority in 1994

Indeed, back in March 1997, Dún Laoghaire Rathdown County Council voted to allocate the Martello Tower at Seapoint, Co. Dublin, as a permanent base of operations for the Society

The Society moved into the Martello Tower in 2004 following extensive restoration work on this historic tower, dating from 1804, which was undertaken by the Society.

However, the building was environmentally unsuitable and sadly the Society had to move its operations to temporary accommodation before relocating to the Carlisle Pier at Dún Laoghaire Harbour

Plans were formulated by the Society for the establishment of an Irish Institute of Genealogical and Heraldic Sciences to incorporate a centre for diasporan and migration studies.

This was an ambitious plan for the Society, although, elements of its proposal were incorporated into a strategic plan for the harbour developed by the Dún Laoghaire Harbour Company.

Unexpectedly in 2016, the management of Dún Laoghaire Harbour Company advised the Society that it required the use of this premises.

Thankfully, the Society was very kindly assisted by the County Council with the provision of the current premises at DLR Loughlistown Leisure Centre.

Although, this premises to the rear of the DLR Loughlinstown Leisure Centre has served the Society extremely well over the past few years, a more permanent base of operation close to the Dún Laoghaire town centre and in easy reach of public transport is now urgently required.

The provision of a more suitable premises to house the Society's archive and research centre should be viewed as an important strategic objective to enhance the cultural, heritage and tourism assets of the Dún Laoghaire Rathdown

Maintaining this important publicly accessible cultural heritage and educational facility in the county should be a priority for the County Council.

The ideal location for this important facility would be in or near Dún Laoghaire Town Centre or on the extensive Dún Laoghaire Harbour estate which is now under the management of the Dún Laoghaire Rathdown County Council.

Councillor O'Callaghan met with the Society's Leas-Chathoirleach and Director of Archival Services & Education, Fiona Tipple, MA, MGSI, (see above photo); Director of Finance, Lua Ó Scolai, MGSI and Director of Digitisation & Genetic Genealogy, Gerard Corcoran, MGSI.

The Cathaoirleach undertook to raise the above issues with the Chief Executive of the County Council.



Ireland in the Medieval World, AD 400-1000

BACK IN PRINT: 'Ireland in the Medieval World AD 400-1000, Landscape, kingship and religion' by Edel Bhreathnach and published by Four Courts Press (ISBN 978-1- 84682-342-8: 316pp: colour illustrations: p/bk €29.95 Web Price €26.95) is another work of interest to genealogists, local historians and clan/sept historians.



The work covers the period in which Ireland was effectively 'claimed' and 'named' in a manner still vividly recognisable today. As Ireland emerged from a world of antiquity with its oral learning and through the coming of Christianity entered the dawn of our recorded history, the rural, urban, ecclesiastical, ceremonial and mythological landscapes of Ireland anchor the history of early Irish society. This is the period in which a great number of our placenames and family names enter our national narrative over a thousand years ago. Understanding the complexities of early Irish society and presenting such coherently to a general readership in a manner that transcends the 'public history' versus 'academic history' debate is a real challenge.

Edel Bhreathnach has certainly produced an exceptionally well researched history of the period that is, very importantly, equally accessible to the general reader, student and academic. The format of the work presents Medieval Ireland under three headings starting with the natural and settled landscape. Here Bhreathnach draws on the ancient tales, beautifully crafted, which seek to explain the natural environment and its relationship with its people as exemplified by the antiquity and descriptiveness of our place-names. She draws

on the wealth of archaeological research conducted over the past century or so to explain patterns of settlement, land use, boundary markings, trade routes and, very significantly, she makes the point that 'Dublin provides one of the best examples of the development of urbanisation in Europe from the tenth century onwards'.

In the next section Bhreathnach explores the structures of society, the rulers and the ruled, the family or clan/sept interrelationships and the importance of lineage and genealogy to Gaelic Ireland. This was a 'client based' society where legal obligations, privileges and rights were enshrined in a native law code, much of which, had its roots in pre-Christian Ireland. The author explores the influences that transformed or impacted upon, Gaelic Ireland, following the arrival of Christianity and later with the initial Viking raids, then their settlement as 'Hiberno-Norse' and the development of trading hubs with links rights across Europe.

The transformative nature of these developments on Irish society is rarely explored in the context of 'public history' which, at times, seems more concerned with major battles and, some would argue, the dubious commemorations of anniversaries. In the third section Bhreathnach looks at 'religion, rituals and ritualists' in a fascinating journey through the hybridization of the ancient native spirituality and early Christianity to form a distinctively Irish or Celtic Christianity. The position of the laity and, indeed, the fusing of Church and regional dynastic Gaelic societal structures is explored with wonderful clarity and beautiful illustrations. As a work of history, Edel Bhreatnach has not only revealed much of Medieval Ireland, but more importantly she has made Medieval Ireland readily identifiable in our modern landscapes, place-names, family names and, of course, in our archaeological and architectural heritage. An excellent read. Highly recommended.

GSI BOARD NEWS

As there was no Board Meeting in August, the next scheduled Board Meeting was held on **Thursday Sept.** 7th 2023 at 11.00hrs via Zoom.

The meeting was chaired by the Leas-Chathaoirleach, **Fíona Tipple**, and seven members were in attendance, including one from Portugal.

The Board agreed (Res: 23/09/1765) to co-opt Eddie Gahan, FGSI, to the Board of Directors and it provisionally allocated the 'Outreach Programme' portfolio to Eddie until the AGM in March 2024.

The Board also discussed a very interesting proposal by Gerard Corcoran, Director of Digitisation & Genetic Genealogy, to participate in the establishment of an 'Atlantic Arc DNA Project' possibly under the EU's Interreg Programme involving EU Members Portugal, Spain, France and Ireland, and the Celtic regions of the UK and its Crown Dependency of the Isle of Man. The matter will now be considered by the Irish DNA Atlas Project Management Team (GSI & RCSI) and report back to the Board in due course.

The Board received the report of the **Select Committee** established to conduct a **feasibility study** into the possibility of holding an "in-person" one-day seminar. The report was accepted (*Res:* 23/09/1769) and the matter will be considered again in the new year.

The Leas-Chathaoirleach delivered a report on the visit to *An Daonchartlann* by Cllr. Denis O'Callaghan, Cathaoirleach of Dún Laoghaire

Rathdown County Council on Wednesday August 30th 2023. The reported noted his deep interest in the work of the Society and his understanding of the issues regarding the location of the facility. (see page 1)

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Preparatory work on the 'National Heraldic Survey' is nearing completion after the General Secretary met with the Honorary Herald in Madrid on August 7th 2023. Dr Antonio Salmerón Cabañas, SHA, FGSI, prepared a detail appraisal of the project and its operation, data collection and ongoing assessment. The Director of Internet Services, Shane Wilson, and the Director of Special Collections, Research & Specialist Groups, Laura Price, are finalising matters and testing of the system is to begin shortly.

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The next Board Meeting will be held October 5th 2023 at 11.00hrs via Zoom.

NATIONAL MONUMENTS SERVICE 6th Annual Archaeology Conference Saturday 7th October 2023 The Printworks, Dublin Castle

Presented by the National Monuments Service of the Department of Housing, Local Government & Heritage and organised by *Archaeology Ireland*.

From the voyages of the first Mesolithic colonisers to the present day, the island of Ireland has seen many new arrivals coming for many different reasons. Archaeology can provide unique insights into how these people adapted to their new surroundings. *Imirce: migration and Ireland through time* will investigate how identities were negotiated within new contexts

Imirce-migration, the overall theme of this programme—looks at the evidence for arrival in Ireland, alongside examples of Irish arrivals elsewhere, as a means of exploring and revealing the multiplicity of identities that have contributed-and continue to contribute-to Irish society through time. This evidence ranges from the growing body of ancient DNA evidence that is beginning to answer some lingering questions about Irish prehistoric populations to the legacy of new or introduced artefact, burial or settlement types that give us some insight into the lives of these new arrivals. Equally, such evidence has an important role in telling us about Ireland's connections with the wider world. During the ages of exploration, colonisation and transplantations, ships crossed oceans to trade, raid or transport. Irish people were on board. The emigrations of the nineteenth century following the devastation of the Famine witnessed a population shift from Ireland to distant lands, where broader connections were forged and where the Irish diaspora expressed their identities in different contexts and emerging new communities.

With the cover featuring 'Detail from *Paddy Daly* by Seán Keating (1955), there is a marvellous selection of articles in the latest issue with the main features being 'From the Editor' Tommy Graham poses the question and discusses the topical issue of 'Dublin's north inner city – a history of violence?'; 'Irish lords and English rulers' by Elizabeth Biggs; 'A villain meeting – the Society of Jesus and a witches' sabbat in seventeenth-century Ireland' by Cameron C. Engelbrecht; 'The omission of Collins from Year's poetic pantheon' by Fionbharr Rogers; 'The Clonfadda Ambush, 2 December 1920' by Conor Carley – this was the winning entry in the Schools' Essay Competition; 'Mapping the Troubles' by Arnold Horner; 'Éamon de Valera's mother-and-baby home' by Colum Kenny; 'Ireland at the League of Nations,1923-46' by Michael Kennedy; 'Agnes Flanagan from Birr – a lonely résistante' by Isadore Ryan; Plus all the regular features including Book Reviews, Letters, Platform, Gems of Architecture, and Local Architees.

'The Lead Mines – Ballycorus and Glendalough in the Nineteenth Century' by Rob Goodbody and published by Wordwell Ltd. The Ballycorus chimney on the side of Carrickgollogan Mountain is a familiar South Dublin landmark and how it came to located there and the role it performed is recalled by Rob Goodbody in his latest book who explains how it came to located there and its connection with mining operations in the Glendalough area by the Mining Company of Ireland from the 19th century until the First World War. In this book Rob explains the mining process in the Glendalough area and the smelting process in Ballycorus, for which siding were built in the Shankill station to receive the ore. The chimney was used to disperse fumes from this Ballycorus smelting operation which was a very dangerous hazardous one for workers. A fascinating and engrossing account of mining in the Dublin and Wicklow Mountains and the production of finished products at Ballycorus from the mined ores. Superbly illustrated, it is a excellent account of the history of this unique industrial monument and is an essential acquisition for those interested in local history and mining and industrial history.

PRÉCIS OF THE AUGUST LECTURE

The Monthly Lecture delivered via Zoom on Tuesday 8th August 2023 was on the very interesting subject of *Policing in Ireland in 1922' by Jim Herlihy, FGSI, author and Irish police historian.

The illustrated talk gave details and statistics of the police forces and their uniforms and badges on public view in Ireland in 1922, i.e., the police forces being disbanded:- the Royal Irish Constabulary, 'Black and Tans' and Auxiliaries and their replacements, i.e. the Civic Guards, the Royal Ulster Constabulary, the Dublin Metropolitan Police (renamed 'Póilfiní Átha Cliath'), the Oriel House Detectives and the Cork Civic Patrol. The War of Independence and post Truce police casualties and the lack of remembrance of them were also discussed and the lost opportunities in reconciliation during the decade of centenaries. The complexities, hurdles and difficulties encountered by the Civic Guards in their formation and deployment throughout the Free State were explained and the reasons why only 181 former RIC men joined, despite the fact that the majority of the Civic Guards organising committee were former RIC men selected by Michael Collins. Details also were given of the former 788 RIC men who joined the Palestine Gendarmerie and the 1,519 who transferred to the Royal Ulster Constabulary. The unique police personalities of the period were also given, none-other than the complicated background and life first registered Civic Guard of the Free State, P.J. Kerrigan from Westport, Co. Mayo who had served in the RIC, the DMP, the Irish Guards in WW1 and the Irish Army and at the same time had a wife and children in Ireland and a wife and children in the United States at the same time, the grandchildren of which were traced & united in 2022 in Westport. The talk also included illustrations of the policing of Michael Collins funeral cortege in Cork City, not by the RIC or the Civic Guards, but by the fledgling Cork Civic Patrol.

Alan Griffin Family Papers


