The designation, some years ago, of the month of October in each year as 'Family History Month' by our good friends in the genealogical societies in the United States and Canada, has now been taken up by societies outside North America.

October is always a special month for this Society because the Society was founded on 25th October 1990 and therefore, we'll celebrate its 34th birthday this month. That's an enviable record of thirty four years as an Irish voluntary organisation promoting an awareness, appreciation and knowledge of our genealogical, heraldic and vexillological heritage

This long record is essentially one of service, free of charge, to the general public and to members of our nation's diaspora. Our volunteers take huge pride in assisting people to access their own family history through their own research.

Our Members, all volunteers, have achieved this objective through organising two Monthly Open Meetings, monthly and annual publications, weekly online "drop-in" sessions and, of course, through the

operation of An Daonchartlann—the Society's Archive & Research Centre, which is open to the public. The facility is located to the rear of DLR Leisure Centre, Loughlinstown, Co. Dublin. The Society is very grateful to Dún Laoghaire Rathdown County Council and DLR Leisure for the facility.

So in our "foundation month" as with all birthdays, one looks back over the past and, with hope, looks to the future. Our continued contribution to the promotion of genealogy and related subjects as open access educational leisure activities available to all in our community, irrespective of prior learning, socioeconomic situation, ethnicity, nationality or creed, requires a permanent base of operation in the Dún Laoghaire Town or Harbour area.

We are in ongoing contact with officials at Dún Laoghaire Rathdown County Council regarding the location of a more suitable home for our Archive & Research Centre. Hopefully, current considerations on the future use of buildings in Dún Laoghaire may yet provide a permanent home for this heritage asset.

SEANAD ÉIREANN

The Genealogical Society of Ireland is a registered 'Nominating Body' for Seanad Éireann (Irish Senate). This means that the Society can choose a candidate to contest the Senate General Election. The Board agreed under Res: 20/03/1503, to extend voting rights to all Members to choose the Society's candidate. This was endorsed by the AGM on 10 March 2020. The Director of Internet Services, Shane Wilson, MGSI, designed a facility that will permit a secure, anonymity assured, electronic voting using the Single Transferable Vote form of Proportional Representation (PR-STV) to allow us to be one of the first Nominating Bodies to extend this franchise. As a General Election for Dáil Éireann is due before March 2025, the Seanad Éireann General Election will follow in due course. Members in Ireland and overseas will be able to select our candidate for the next Seanad Éireann General Election.

'The Royal Irish Constabulary - A Complete Alphabetical List of Officers and Men, 1816-1922' by Jim Herlihy, FGSI, (ISBN: 978-1-851852-502-8: 524pp: H/bk: Catalogue Price: €75.00: Pre-Publication Order Price: €50.00). Orders for this book will be despatched when printed by Four Courts Press in December 2024.



In 1836 the four provincial constabularies of the Constabulary of Ireland were amalgamated to form the Irish Constabulary, which in September 1867 was awarded the prefix 'Royal' and in August 1922 the Royal Irish Constabulary was disbanded. The numbering system for each rank and file member of the RIC began in 1836 with number one being allocated to the most senior person who transferred from the provincial constabulary and who had joined on 1 August 1816. Additional numbers were added in order of seniority. This book contains a complete alphabetical list from 1 August 1816 to 31 August 1922 and represents 83,521 men. In addition, RIC men of the officer class who enlisted as cadets, numbering 635 were not allocated RIC numbers, however, their names are included in this book, and they are identified by being set in italics. The names and numbers of RIC men who were promoted from the ranks, numbering 1,507 are also identified by being set in italics. This text contains chapters on how to access original RIC registers, it also discusses RIC Microfiche Index. A list of surnames, first names and service numbers are given and for officers additional details are included.

To facilitate the researcher in using the alphabetical list provided in this book, the

lists of the original Registers of Service and Officers Service Registers as contained in the National Archives, Kew (HO 184 Series) are included in the introductory chapter, as are the lists of microfilm copies as contained in the Church of Jesus Christ of Latter Day Saints Family History Centres (FHL 085 Microfilm Series); the National Archives, Dublin (MFA 24 Microfilm Series); the Public Record Office of Northern Ireland, Belfast (MIC 454 Microfilm Series); the Garda Museum and Archives Series, Dublin Castle (GM/RIC Microfilm Series). This book points the way to each RIC Service Record.

Jim Herlihy, FGSI, a retired member of the Garda Síochána, a co-founder of the Garda Síochána Historical Society and a Fellow of the Genealogical Society of Ireland, has worked on these sources for many years. His many publica-tions include The Irish Revenue Police: A short history and genealogical guide to the 'Poteen Hussars' (2018) and The Royal Irish Constabulary: a short history and genealogical guide (2016) and Royal Irish Constabulary officers: a biographical dictionary and genealogical guide, 1816–1922 (2005). THE IRISH IN THE RESISTANCE

'The Irish in the Resistance: The Untold Stories of the Ordinary Heroes who Resisted Hitler' by Clodagh Finn and John Horgan (ISBN: 978-0717191352:272pp:H/bk:Price €23.00)



In June 1940, the fall of France prompted General Charles de Gaulle to make an impassioned rallying call in his famous radio speech broadcast by the BBC to his fellow citizens to fight back against the Germans. This speech was later credited with igniting a spark of resistance which eventually grew into a vast underground network of

civilians against Nazi occupation in Europe. This new book is a collection of real-life stories of Irish men and women who joined the Resistance. For example, Janie McCarthy, a teacher from Killarney who was active in five different resistance networks in Paris; Capt. John Keany from Cork, who parachuted behind enemy lines to help the Resistance in Italy; and Catherine Crean, the Irish governess born on Moore Street in Dublin, who was arrested for helping the Belgian Resistance and sent to the Ravensbrück concentration camp. IRISH HISTORY with Davy Holden



In Ireland, we generally start primary school education at five years old. For the next thirteen years, until we are eighteen years old, we learn the native language of Ireland, which is called Gaeilge. I recently reminded myself that when I was in attending school, history was not my favourite subject - Gaeilge was. Unfortu-

nately, it can be quite common to completely drop the language when our secondary school education comes to an end, and this is exactly what I did. My grandfather, Fintan O'Byrne, grew up in a house with my Great-Grandfather, Liam O'Byrne, who was a fluent Gaeilgeoir. Liam had some rules in the household. Well, only one main rule: the only language that was allowed to be spoken in the home was Gaeilge (Irish). On the other side of my family tree was my Great-Great-Grandfather, Thomas McCormack, a fluent Gaeilgeoir, who lived in Connemara and worked as a teacher. As I was thinking about this recently, if I'm honest, I grew pretty ashamed of myself. Gaeilge is such a crucial element of my family history, and once upon a time, it was my favourite subject in school where I could speak it very confidently. I have no reason to not be fluent in the Irish language; I'm constantly surrounded by it – most of my close friends are fluent speakers. Over the past few months, I've been bringing Gaeilge into my everyday life. Even if it's a quick 'cén chaoi in a bhfuil tú?' (how are you?) or a slán (goodbye) when I'm with my friends. Luckily, there are some fantastic creators online that are spreading awareness and even teaching Gaeilge. With the benefits of social media, there was never a better time to learn (or in my case, relearn) a language. If I could say one thing to all of the young people in Ireland that are just about to finish secondary school education: Ná déan an botún céanna liomsa (don't make the same mistake as me).

VEXILLOLOGY

The Society is a Member of FIAV (International Federation of Vexillological Associations) and An Daonchartlann—the Society's Archive and Research Centre, has a small but growing collection of books on vexillology-the study of flags and emblems.



Some people consider vexillology to be part of heraldic studies. Indeed, it has much in common with heraldry, but nowadays it is seen separate but linked subject.
As genealogists or indeed,

social or local historians, we know that our ancestors, armigerous or not, were either flag carriers or flag followers, the latter includes all armies, political movements or trades unions. This makes the study of the use of any historic flags and banners very interesting as it adds to our family story at home and, often, overseas.

PRÉCIS OF THE SEPTEMBER LECTURE

On Tuesday September 10th 2024 at our Evening Open Meeting we were delighted to welcome as our Speaker, **Ashwini Shanmugam** of the **Royal College of Surgeons in Ireland (RCSI)** and a member of the *Irish DNA Atlas* team, a collaboration with this Society. The topic was the '*Demographic History of Ireland & Britain*'.

Recent studies have explored fine-scale population structure within the island of Ireland and in Britain by harnessing information-rich chunks of the genome code called haplotypes. Through haplotype-based methods, they revealed subtle regional genetic diversity within Ireland, and identified migration barriers and corridors over Ireland and the UK. They also found signals of admixture between Irish-British populations and the European population. We have extended these findings by identifying time-dependent regional genetic changes across Ireland and Britain not previously reported.

The RCSI study reveals relative and sustained isolation in the peripheries of the UK (Orkney, Wales) and the Isle of Man, and more recent isolation in north-west Ireland owing to a history of migration and settlement in these regions. Furthermore, the scientists complemented findings from their Irish genetic data with genealogical observations by analysing surnames consistent with historical records of Viking and Norman invasions. Their Irish reference data can be used to predict regional ancestries of Irish individuals in larger datasets such as the UK Biobank. Finally, they used genetic information to date haplotype sharing between Ireland and Britain with Europe which shows high levels of old Germanic and Swedish influence in Britain and relatively more recent Norwegian signals in Ireland, demonstrating the signatures of these migrations the on modern Irish and British genome. These results can therefore be used to understand the driving forces of rare variant frequencies and disease risk association within the Irish population.

HERALDIC PODCASTS

Check out www.facebook.com/heraldry.ireland for the new podcast on the coat-of-arms for **Eugene McCarthy** designed and emblazoned

The podcast was produced in Spanish and English allowing for a much wider international audience. The idea for the production was simple and straightforward.

Most people, while admiring the coat-of-arms, will not readily understand the symbolism and this is largely due to the language in heraldry.

The reason this heraldic language or terminology is employed by heralds throughout the world is simply that a "blazon" (description) of any arms is normally sufficient for another herald to draw those arms.

This blazon is 'Argent, a Stag trippant Gules, attired and hoofed Sable on a terrace in base Vert charged with a fess Or; on a chief Sable three geese volant contourné Argent'.

The design is based on the traditional McCarthy Arms, however, for difference elements were included to reflect the homeplace of the armiger as follows: The Chief Sable (top bar in black) is to signify 'Garryduff' ("black garden"), the Townland (smallest Irish land division) of the armiger's ancestral homestead.

The geese refer to the local parish, Monagea ("bogland of the geese") and the colours of Monagea GAA Club, founded in 1896, are shown in the base of the arms.

The antlers and hooves of the stag are rendered in black for difference and to reflect the homeplace of Garryduff – the black, of course, refers to the peaty soil of the area.

The geese flying also represents those who emigrated from the homestead. The direction is to signify the migratory journey of the geese as many of the Garryduff McCarthys living overseas, like many Irish families, frequently return home for special occasions, joyous and sad.

This imagery also evokes the famous "Wild Geese" Irish of previous centuries who emigrated to mainland Europe to serve in the armies of France, Spain, and Austria.

The Motto, *An Garraí Dubh go Brách*, means "*Garryduff Forever*" - no place like home!

NEW BOOK ON ROYAL IRISH CONSTABULARY

As flagged last month, Jim Herlihy, FGSI, advised us of the imminent publication of his latest work on the Royal Irish Constabulary and it is now out.

*Royal Irish Constabulary Volunteers 1914-1919— Roll of Honour' by Jim Herlihy, FGSI, (ISBN: 978 -8-89496-537-6: 136pp: P/bk: A4 size: Price €20.00 plus postage) is published by Staten House, (https://www.statenhouse.com) and it lists former members of the RIC who lost their lives WWI.



At the outbreak of the war some seventy British army reservists serving with the RIC were called up. Later following an appeal by the RIC Inspector, Sir Neville Chamberlain for further RIC men to

enlist, a total of 752 RIC men of various ranks served in the British army during the war. 179 men never returned. They came from all around Ireland with the majority from Cork, Mayo, Tipperary, and Celving.

The overwhelming majority were Catholic (133) and there was even one Mormon. All the casualties were aged between 21 and 42 years.
