COUNTY ARMS & FLAGS OF IRELAND

The Inaugural Annual Vexillology Ireland Lecture will be held via Zoom on Tuesday 11th February 2025 at 20.00hrs (UTC+0) (Irish Time).



The guest speaker will be the renowned vexillologist and author of Ireland's only guide to flag design, 'Flagging Ireland', Stan Zamyatin-Moore, MA.

Stan has delivered presentations on Irish vexillology

around the world, including as far away as Sydney Australia, where he represented Vexillology Ireland and this Society at the International Congress of Vexillology and at the General Meeting of the International Federation of Vexillological Associations (FIAV). Attendance at these two events was very generously sponsored by Dún Laoghaire Rathdown County Council in 2015



Stan had previously represented the Society at the ICV at Rotterdam with Tom Conlon in 2013, and attended the 1st National Conference of Vexillology and Heraldry held in Tbilisi, the

capital city of the Republic of Georgia, in 2016. Attendance again with the assistance of Dún Laoghaire Rathdown County Council. Over the years he has attended and delivered papers on the history, symbolism and usage of flags at venues around mainland Europe and in Great Britain.

During the 'Bratacha-International Festival of Flags & Emblems' held in Dún Laoghaire in 2013, held as part of the nationwide tourism initiative of 'The Gathering Ireland', Stan curated Ireland's first exhibition of flags and emblems.

This exhibition was held in the National Maritime Museum of Ireland in Dún Laoghaire and it was so popular a visitor attraction that it continued beyond the end of the festival for a further five weeks

Stan was very ably assisted in this endeavour by

John Paul Durkan, then a Community Garda based at Dún Laoghaire, and currently a County Councillor on Dún Laoghaire Rathdown County Council.

NORROY AND ULSTER KING OF ARMS

On behalf of the Board and Members of the Society, our President, Amb (ret) Francis M. O'Donnell, FGSI, and the Society's Honorary Herald, Dr Antonio Salmerón Cabañas, SHA, FGSI, send their warmest congratulations to Clive Cheesman, MA, PhD, who was appointed to the office of Norroy and Ulster King of Arms and Principal Herald of the North Part of England and of Northern Ireland by King Charles III.

The office of Norroy & Ulster King of Arms is based at the College of Arms in London and was created in March 1943 following the removal of the Ulster King of Arms to London from Dublin Castle. Dr Cheesman becomes the 78th king of arms of the northern province which, according to the 'College of Arms Newsletter' (Jan. 2025, No. 77), was first recorded in 1276.

'Irish Nurses in the NHS—An oral history'

'Irish Nurses in the NHS - An oral history' by Louise Ryan, Gráinne McPolin and Neha Doshi (ISBN: 978-1-80151-163-6: 232pp: Ills. P/bk: Price: €19.95: Web-Price: €17.95) published by Four Courts Press this month.



Many Irish people in their sixties and over may have spent time working in Great Britain or most certainly, had close friends or members of their families working across the Irish Sea. Many who went over during the fifties and sixties found work in the sectors of the economy that became almost synonymous with the Irish in Britain like construction, transport and factory work. These were hard times in Ireland, especially in rural Ireland, and although, by the late 1960s Ireland was beginning to emerge from an economic slump that had bedevilled the country since de Valera's economic war with Britain in the 1930s. Emigration was high, initially to work in the war industries during WW2 and then in the post-war reconstruction of British cities. It was in this era of reconstruction that the newly elected Labour Party government in London under Prime Minister, Clement Attlee, MP, that the National Health Service was introduced by the Health Minister, Aneurin Bevan, MP, on 5th July 1948. The core principles of the NHS were that

it had to be comprehensive, universal and free at the point of delivery. The Irish in Britain had access to the NHS services from the beginning and with its expansion, new opportunities for employment in the NHS opened for Irish women and men to train for various roles, especially in nursing and care-providers. By the 1960s approximately 30,000 Irish-born nurses were working across the NHS, constituting around 12% of all nursing staff. While many Irish families produced at least one nurse and many of those emigrated, so far there has been little recognition of the enormous contribution of Irish nurses to health care in Britain over the decades. This is certainly something that should be addressed by the authorities in the UK and possibly, on the initiative of the unions representing the nursing and midwifery sectors, a suitable manner of permanent recognition could be considered.

This book is based on forty-five interviews and tells the stories of Irish nurses in their own words using rich oral history and photographs – a treasure trove for the family historian. The stories cover the rigours of training in the hospitals to the fun and excitement of the dancehalls free from the stifling conservatism of rural Ireland at the time. These Irish dancehalls were a sort of home from home for young Irish nurses and indeed, many met their future spouses at these venues. This wonderful social study explores their life experiences as nurses and as Irish migrants in British society which, was generally welcoming and accommodating, but certainly not without its challenges.

Louise Ryan is a Senior Professor of Sociology and director of the Global Diversities and Inequalities research centre, London Metropolitan University, and has extensively researched Irish migration to Britain. Gráinne McPolin is a radio producer and podcaster. She is a former nurse having spent many years of her career working in Britain's National Health Service hospitals. Neha Doshi is a PhD researcher and Associate Lecturer at London Metropolitan University. Her research focuses on race and media. (Text informed by FCP website)

GSI BOARD NEWS

The Cathaoirleach convened a Special Meeting of the Board on **Thursday February 6th 2025** at 11.00hrs with six of the nine directors in attendance.

The Board considered the Society's continued use of the Twitter/X social media platform and decided with the adoption of *Res: 25/02/1891* to move to Bluesky over the coming month.

As usual **Lua Ó Scolaí, MGSI**, *Director of Finance*, delivered the **Monthly Accounts** for the period ending 31.01.2025 and provided an update on the Society's Annual Accounts.

The report of the **Select Committee on the Website** was considered and adopted (*Res: 25/02/1895*). The *Director of Internet Services*, **Shane Wilson, MGSI**, had long advised on the need for a total rebuild of the website to meet the needs of the Society across all platforms and devices.

A newly designed website is currently under construction by **Pedro Antonio Torres Vera** of **AV Web Shield, Web Design and Cybersecurity.** It is hoped to have the new website operational by the AGM next month.

The Board conducted the annual review of the **Open Meetings** based on a report presented by the General Secretary. It was then agreed (*Res: 25/02/1896*) to continue with incorporeal meetings, however, with possibly occasional in-person informal gatherings such as "coffee mornings". Hopefully, we'll have more on this proposal next month.

The first Review of the **Society's Development Plan** was undertaken and although, progress in some areas was noticeable, all agreed that we must do

more to advance the circa 60 objectives in the plan. The report presented by the General Secretary on the actions to date was adopted (*Res: 25/02/1897*).

With the adoption of *Res: 25/02/1898*) the Board, once again, established a JGSI Select Committee to produce and published the *Annual Journal of the Genealogical Society of Ireland* for 2025. The JGSI 2025 will mark the 35th anniversary of the foundation of the Society and the 25th anniversary of the incorporation of the Society under the Companies Act.

Fiona Tipple FGSI, Director of Archival Services & Education, on behalf of Eddie Gahan, FGSI, Director of the Outreach Programme, delivered a report on the hugely successful GSI Stands at the Holiday World Shows in Belfast and Dublin last month. The stands were extremely busy and the need for more volunteers was very evident.

IRISH HISTORY with Davy Holden



In keeping with the theme of this month's *Inaugural Annual Vexillology Ireland Lecture*, let's look at Thomas Francis Meagher.

In 1823, Thomas Francis Meagher was born in what is now the Granville Hotel in Waterford City. But shortly after he was born, his family moved just down the road, to

19, The Mall, Waterford City.

After graduating from college, he became heavily involved in the movement for Irish independence alongside the Young Irelanders and the Irish Confederation

In 1848, Meagher travelled to Paris to research the revolutionary events there. When he returned to Ireland, he brought with him a gift he received from the French - a green, white and orange tricolour flag (not the national flag of Ireland) and this flag was first flown at 33, The Mall, Waterford City, on 7th March

Months later, after the 1848 rebellion, he was arrested, tried, and sentenced to death. However, his sentence was commuted to transportation for life to Van Diemen's Land. He spent two and a half years on the island before making his escape and travelling back to the other side of the world again. However, he would not land in Ireland, he would land in the United States and settle in New York City.

When the American Civil War began in 1861, Meagher took the role of Captain with the 69th Regiment (Fighting 69th), but when Michael Corcoran was captured at the First Battle of Bull Run, Meagher took his position as Colonel. He then founded an Irish Brigade and was commissioned as Brigadier-General.

After the war, he became Acting Governor of Montana Territory but on 1st July 1867, he was travelling on a steamboat along the Missouri River heading for Fort Benton in Montana and he went overboard, with his body never being found.

Although he doesn't have a grave, there are multiple transatlantic memorials commemorating Thomas Francis Meagher, like Waterford City, Helena, Montana and Green-Wood Cemetery, Brooklyn - just to name a few.

However, after a well organised, targeted and highly professional campaign conducted by Ms. Purcell, unfortunately luck wasn't with her on the day.

A previous nominee of this Society, Cllr. Joe Conway from County Waterford was elected on the Cultural & Educational Panel. Cllr Conway was nominated this time by Údarás na Gaeltacha.

Another candidate in the Seanad Éireann General Election was **Senator Victor Boyhan, MGSI**, who was re-elected on the **Agricultural Panel.**

PRÉCIS OF THE JANUARY LECTURE

On Tuesday 14th January 2025 at our Monthly Evening Open Meeting we were delighted to welcome from Talamh an Eise / Newfoundland, Craig Morrissey of the Family History Society of Newfoundland and Labrador (FHSNL). Craig delivered a very interesting and hugely informative presentation 'Across the Pond:

**Resources in Newfoundland & Labrador for Your Family History Research' which has been uploaded to the Society's YouTube Channel (see bottom of this page for the link).

He opened his presentation with a brief history of Newfoundland and Labrador from the indigenous people through the Vikings to the arrival of Giovanni Caboto (John Cabot) in 1497. The island of Newfoundland was settled seasonally at first as workers from south west England and south east Ireland were brought over to fish or to process the fish for shipment back across the Atlantic. These workers tended to go back home following each season until the late seventeenth century when more permanent settlement began to be the norm and indeed, as Craig explained, the majority of the Irish population of Newfoundland is a pre-famine diasporic group unlike those in other parts of Canada.

Craig then explained the various records that are available for researching family history in Newfoundland and Labrador going through the types of records, their location, accessibility and crucially, what sort of information is available in each. This was extremely informative and, indeed, Craig's style of delivery and careful attention to detail was greatly appreciated by his audience in this Zoom session from Ireland and overseas. As a professional genealogist, Craig guided us through the various repositories as if we were there in his home beautiful city of St. John's and, of course, he explained the geography of the island pointing out the various settlements and especially, those with Newfoundland Irish communities. He ended his presentation with a plug for the Genealogy Conference to be held in St. John's from July 25th to 27th 2025. A lively Q+A followed.
