It is very fitting that we open our 35th Anniversary Year with our firstly monthly lecture of the New Year on Tuesday 14th January 2025 at 20.00hrs on a very special place and its enduring and deep Irish connections— Talamh an Éisc or the beautiful island of Newfoundland

Many remember the wonderful talk given at the Society's 2023 Annual General Meeting by Dr **Edmund Gilbert** of the Royal College of Surgeons in Ireland (RCSI) on a paper that was published by 'Nature' on 'A mosaic founder population of an Irish and British diaspora from 300 years ago'. This study drew on the 'Irish DNA Atlas' project an academic collaboration between the RCSI and this Society. It generated great interest here and in Canada and, no doubt, further studies will follow.



A Dictionary of Irish Saints (Second Edition)

A Dictionary of Irish Saints – Second Edition' by Pádraig Ó Riain (ISBN: 978-1-80151-162-9 : H/bk : 740pp : Price: €65.00 : Web Price: €58.50) published by Four Courts Press.

Whether one's interest convers genealogy, heraldry, vexillology, local history or social history, geography, or onomastics, especially, toponymy, or any combinations thereof, this book will be of considerable interest for those with Irish ancestry or connections. Indeed, the subject of the forthcoming *Inaugural Annual Vexillilogy Ireland Lecture* (see page 1) will likely refer to the influence of the legacy or history of Irish saints in the symbolism employed for coats-of-arms and flags of places and organisations throughout Ireland.



Scarcely a parish in Ireland is without one or more dedications to saints, in the form of churches in ruins, holy wells or other ecclesiastical monuments. This book is a guide to the (mainly documentary) sources of information on the saints named in these dedications, for those who have an interest in them, scholarly or otherwise. The need for a summary biographical dictionary of Irish saints, containing information on such matters as feast days, localizations, chronology and genealogies, although stressed over sixty years ago by the eminent Jesuit and Bollandist scholar Paul Grosjean, has never before been satisfied.

Professor Ó Riain has been working in the field of Irish hagiography for upwards of forty years, and the material for the over 1,000 entries in his *Dictionary* has come from a variety of sources, including Lives of the saints, martyrologies, genealogies of the saints, shorter tracts on the saints (some of them accessible only in manuscripts), annals, annates, collections of folklore, Ordnance Survey letters, and other documents. The body of the *Dictionary* is preceded by a preface, list of sources and introduction, and is followed by comprehensive indices of parishes, other places (mainly townlands), alternate (mainly anglicized) names, subjects, and feast days. This second edition also incorporates the material from *A supplement to A Dictionary of Irish saints* (2022).

Pádraig Ó Riain is Professor Emeritus of Early and Medieval Irish at University College Cork, and the previous holder of Visiting Professorships at Bochum and Freiburg in Germany and at Aberystwyth in Wales. He is a former holder of the Parnell Fellowship at Magdalen College, Cambridge, and was the first Irish scholar to be awarded the Humboldt Prize. A former President of the Irish Texts Society and a former Member of Council of the Royal Irish Academy, Professor Ó Riain is the author of numerous publications on Irish hagiography, place-names, personal names, and textual transmission. GSI BOARD NEWS

The Cathaoirleach convened a Special Meeting of the Board on **Thursday December 12th 2024** at 11.00hrs via Zoom to fulfil the Society's duties as a **Nominating Body for Seanad Éireann**. Five members were in attendance with four apologies received. The quorum is five with nine directors.

As reported in the December issue, the Board was disappointed that no application for candidature in the Seanad Éireann General Election was received by the deadline on 3 December 2024. Following the Board meeting on Thursday 5th December 2024, concern was expressed regarding the process, the tightness of the deadline immediately after the General Election and the eventual receipt of a few applications thereafter.

The General Secretary, as is usual, provided an Explanatory Memorandum on an aspect of the process to assist the Board in its deliberations.

At the specially convened Board Meeting the matter was reconsidered and it was agreed by a majority in a vote to nominate Sabina Purcell, a solicitor and member of the Kilmacud-Stillorgan Local History Society, to be a candidate for the Seanad Éireann Election on the Cultural & Educational Panel.

The Leas-Chathaoirleach, **Fíona Tipple, MA, FGSI**, was charged with lodging the Nomination Papers with the Seanad Returning Officer, Martin Groves, on Tuesday 17th December 2024.

The first meeting of the Board of Directors in 2025 was held on **Thursday January 9th 2025** at 11.00hrs via Zoom. We had a eight in attendance with **Eddie Gahan, FGSI**, in Belfast for the Holiday

World show which started on Friday 10th January.

In order to provide some deferred matters, including, Fund Raising, Membership Drive and the Heraldry Project, with the necessary time for consideration by the Board, these agenda items were rescheduled.

Lua Ó Scolaí, MGSI, Director of Finance, delivered the Monthly Accounts for P.E. 31.12.2024. He also presented a budget for 2025 and prepared an inventory of the Society's equipment.

The **Draft Annual Accounts** for the P.E. 31.12.2024 were presented by the Director of Finance and were adopted under *Res:* 25/01/1887. These accounts will be forwarded to the Society's auditors and it is hoped to have the audited accounts ready for the Annual General Meeting in March 2025.

The issue of the current website was considered and the urgent need for a totally **new website** was unanimously agreed. A **Select Committee** will be established at the February meeting to progress this matter as expeditiously as possible given its urgency.

Fiona Tipple FGSI, Director of Archival Services & Education proposed the establishment of 'An Daon-chartlann—Monographic Series' as a new electronic publication to make available transcripts, extracts, detailed descriptions, facsimiles, images and/or essays on the Society's archival collections. The proposal was seconded by Laura Price, MGSI, Director of Special Collections, Research & Specialist Groups and was adopted under Res: 25/01/1888.

The next Board Meeting will be held on **Thursday 6th February 2025** at 11.00hrs via Zoom.

IRISH HISTORY with Davy Holden



I'm currently living in Brooklyn, and a few miles away from me are the graves of Theobald's wife, son and granddaughter, in Green-Wood Cemetery.

Theobald Wolfe Tone is a household name in Ireland. He was one of the founding members of the United Irishmen who were founded in Belfast in 1791, and the United Irishmen

are known as the founders of Irish Republicanism. In 1785, in Dublin, Martha Witherington married the Irish revolutionary at the age of only 17 years old. Martha would then change her name to Matilda. She moved from Ireland to New Jersey and then from New Jersey to France, following Theobald along on his journey to overthrow the parliament in Ireland and form an independent Irish Republic.

After Wolfe Tone's arrest and death, she initially decided to stay in France and try build a life there for their three kids. But two out of their three kids would die of tuberculosis in France, so in 1807, she moved with her one remaining son, William, to America. Three years later in 1810, herself and William moved

Three years later in 1810, herself and William moved back to France again. Matilda got French citizenship for her son through Napoleon Bonaparte and William would become a Cadet in the Cavalry Military School and eventually rise to the rank of Lieutenant in the 8th Chasseurs. After the defeat of Napoleon in 1815, the British Government denied William entry into Ireland, so the family would move once more from France to the United States and eventually settle in Georgetown, Washington DC in 1817.

In 1826, two years before passing away, William published two books on the life of his father, Theobald

In 1826, two years before passing away, William published two books on the life of his father, Theobald Wolfe Tone. Both William and his mother Matilda were initially buried in Georgetown, Washington DC, but in 1891, they were both re-interred in Green-Wood Cemetery, Brooklyn.

On a hill, in the beautiful Green-Wood cemetery,

On a hill, in the beautiful Green-Wood cemetery, Matilda and William are buried beside William's daughter, Grace Georgiana Tone Maxwell. Theobald Wolfe Tone himself, the father of William and the husband of Matilda, is buried in Bodenstown in County Kildare, Ireland.

SEANAD ELECTION 2025

The Society is a registered 'Nominating Body' for Seanad Éireann (Irish Senate) and, as such, it may nominate a candidate to contest the Senate Election.

The Board agreed at the Special Meeting held on Thursday 12th December 2024 (*Res: 24/12/1880*), by a majority vote of the members present, to nominate Ms. Sabina Purcell, of Kilmacud, Co. Dublin, as the Society's nominee for candidature in the forthcoming Seanad Éireann General Election.

Ms. Purcell, a solicitor and member of the Kilmacud Stillorgan Local History Society, will be contesting the election on the Cultural & Educational Panel. Many of her interests are aligned with the public policy issues raised by this Society over the years in respect of heritage and culture. See: www.sabinapurcell.ie

The Nomination Papers were lodged with the Seanad Returning Officer in Leinster House on Tuesday 17th December 2024 by our Leas-Chathaoirleach, **Fíona Tipple, MA, FGSI**, accompanied by the nominee.

Another candidate in the Seanad Éireann General Election is **Senator Victor Boyhan**, **MGSI**, who is seeking re-election on the **Agricultural Panel**.

Senator Boyhan has been a public representative since he was first elected as a County Councillor on **Dún Laoghaire Rathdown County Council** in 1999. He very narrowly lost his seat in 2004, but was re-elected in 2009. He has been a very active Senator since 2016.

Senator Boyhan has been a very strong supporter of this Society for many years and has been proactive in the search for a more suitable premises for the Society.

Recently Senator Boyhan produced a presentation of four linked short **YouTube** videoclips on his life as a senator and his passion for politics, highlighting issues and being a voice for some very worthy causes.

PRÉCIS OF THE DECEMBER LECTURE

On Tuesday 10th December 2024 at our Evening Open Meeting we were delighted to welcome as our Speaker, Jim Herlihy, FGSI on the topic 'RIC WW1 Casualties & Research Resources'.



The talk was based on Jim's research undertaken for his lates book 'Royal Irish Constabulary Volunteers 1914-1919— Roll of Honour' (ISBN: 978 -8-89496-537-6: 136pp: P/ bk: A4 size: Price €20.00 plus postage) which was published by Staten House, (https://www.statenhouse.com). The Royal Irish Constabulary (RIC) was a paramilitary "colonial style" police force in Ireland mainly dealing with areas outside of the Dublin metropolitan area which had its own police force. The RIC was disbanded in the 26 counties in 1922.

The book lists former members of the RIC who lost their lives in the First World War and who recorded as such by the Commonwealth War Graves Commission. Jim explained that at the outbreak of the war some seventy British army reservists serving with the RIC were called up. Then, later following an appeal by the RIC Inspector, Sir Neville Chamberlain for further RIC men to enlist, a total of 752 RIC men of various ranks served in the British army during the war. 179 men never returned to their families in Ireland.

They came from all around Ireland with the majority from Cork, Mayo, Tipperary, and Galway. The overwhelming majority were Catholic (133) and there was even one Mormon. All the casualties were aged between 21 and 42 years. Jim's research provided greater detail on the lives of these men and their families. He provided illustrations and photographs of the RIC barracks in Ireland where some of them served and gave a general account of the duties, living accommodation and day-to-day lives of the Royal Irish Constabulary in Ireland at the time.
